Section B part (b) 'How far do you agree with this statement?' 4 named examples and critical texts. (25 marks) *Suggested time 40 minutes.* 

- "An artist needs to **experience nature at first hand** in order to represent it successfully". Hfdya? (named works pre and post 1850. Texts.) (*Edexcel sample question*)
- The purpose of depicting nature is invariably to record reality. Hfdya?
- There is always a symbolic/secondary meaning embedded in depictions of nature.
- Depictions of nature must be beautiful.
- All landscapes/seascapes reflect humanity's awe at the power of nature?
- There is no place for politics in depictions of nature.
- Paintings of nature are a reflection of the artist/his or her times.
- Social/cultural/political contexts have more influence over depictions of nature than neutral observation.
- An artist always has to alter and adapt the appearance of nature to suit their materials and processes.
- The practical functions of buildings tend to problematise their harmony with nature
- Paintings of nature are a reflection of the artist/his or her time.
- How do works of art concerned with nature relate to the socio/cultural/political context in which they were made?
- Artworks / buildings located within natural settings are always more in harmony with nature.
- As nature is unchanging, the meaning or appearance of art inspired by nature does not change over time.
- You need to be familiar with nature to interpret artworks inspired by nature.
- How does the meaning of an artwork change over time/how and why might an art work be interpreted differently at different moments in history?
- Depictions of nature should be scientific.
- Industrialisation has changed the representation of nature forever.
- Non-western artists have a more direct relationship with nature'.
